


VT's Correctional Facilities

Facility, So. Burlington




VERMONT INCARCERATED POPULATION (1980-2016)


The proportion of women incarcerated in Vermont has increased, while the number of men in jail and prison has decreased.

- As of 2017, the incarceration rate for black people in Vermont was nearly 10 times that of the incarceration rate for white people.
- In 2017, the legislature
 established the Racial Disparities
 in the Criminal and Juvenile
 Justice System Advisory Panel to
 further examine this issue, and in
 2019 Governor Scott appointed
 the state's first Racial Equity
 Executive Director.

Justice Reinvestment I

Council on State Governments – 2007

- Method:
 - data-driven, evidence-based approach
 - analyze data & engage stakeholders
- Aim
 - reduce corrections spending
 - reinvest savings in new policies
- Outcome
 - reduce recidivism
 - increase public safety

Justice Reinvestment I


reinvestment legislation

- Transitional housing; electronic monitoring;
 substance misuse treatment in prisons (2009-2013)
- Statewide definition of recidivism; investment in programs with outcomes (2011)
- Statewide pretrial services (2014)
- Medication-assisted treatment expanded (2018)

Justice Reinvestment II

August – December 2019

- Certain categories of violent crime & recidivism rates are increasing
- State's pretrial population continues to rise
- Prison facilities above design capacity
- Community supervision (80%) impact & nature of supervision revocations not clear
- CRCF & NWSCF facilities in decline
- Policymakers need more nuanced data



- Reducing admissions
- Expanding alternatives
- Expanding treatment for mental health & substance use disorders
- Eliminating of cash bail
- Prosecutorial reform
- Decarcerate women
- Reduce P&P revocations
- Improve community supervision
- Increase data collection to reduce racial disparities
