Equal Pay Day is Tuesday, April 10th

Since 1996, Equal Pay Day has symbolized how far into the year American women must work, on average, to earn as much as American men earned the previous year, due to the gender wage gap. Fifty-five years after President Kennedy signed the Equal Pay Act, the wage gap for women working full time has narrowed from 41 cents in 1963, to 20 cents now, a dramatic improvement, but at this same rate of closure, it will be 2119 before the gap disappears. Vermont women fair slightly better than the national average, raking 5th, with a 14-cent wage gap. The gap is notably worse for women of color in our state.

Vermont Commission on Women (VCW), the League of Women Voters of Vermont, and Business and Professional Women Vermont (BPW) invite you to join this annual gathering of advocates at the State House the morning of Equal Pay Day, Tuesday, April 10th to help bring attention to the gender wage gap. Upon opening of the day's legislative session, projected to be 10:30 a.m., a resolution designating it Equal Pay Day in Vermont will be read in the House, sponsored Representative Mollie Burke and other policymakers, and observed by advocates for equal pay

dressed in red, symbolizing women being “in the red” due to the gender wage gap. At noon, Governor Scott will sign an Equal Pay Day proclamation in his ceremonial office. This brief event will include several speakers, including Marilyn Grunewald of BPW, and VCW’s Cary Brown. Care about the wage gap? Interested in joining us? We’ve love to have you! Let's Grow Kids & Vermont Commission on Women Release White Paper: *Women, Work, and Child Care*

Ensuring Vermont has enough high-quality, affordable child care is essential to supporting gender equality in the workplace, according to a new report co-

authored by Let's Grow Kids (LGK) and the Vermont Commission on Women (VCW). The report outlines policy recommendations—including increasing investments in Vermont's Child Care Financial Assistance Program and passing paid family leave—as key strategies to supporting working women and their families.

“In the US, women, more than men, fill the role of primary caregivers for young children. While some women intentionally make the choice to leave the workforce or scale back work arrangements to care for children, research has found that many women don't have a choice in the matter, instead making these arrangements due to child care challenges—particularly the inability to find or afford quality child care. When a community offers a comprehensive early care and learning system that includes access to paid family and medical leave as well as child care options that are high-quality, affordable and easily accessible, parents and guardians—especially women—are able to make balanced decisions about what works best for their families.” [Read the entire white paper here.](#)

Life in a Jar: The Irena Sendler Project

Dr. Jack Mayer tells the story of Irena Sendler, a holocaust hero who rescued 2,500 children from the Warsaw ghetto. Sendler's story remained unknown after the war—until three Kansas teens uncovered a reference to her heroism 60 years later. They helped transform her story into a National History Day play called *Life in a Jar*, finally bringing recognition to Sendler's heroism and helping to open dialogue about the Holocaust in Poland. The "girls from Kansas" continue to champion Sendler's legacy—courage, tolerance, and respect for all—and are living examples of the power individuals have to change the world.
